Prof. Shu-Ti Chiou, Chair of International Task Force on Health Promoting Hospitals and Age-Friendly Health Care is a specialist of Family Medicine, Ph.D. in epidemiology and Professor of Health Policy. She is also an elected member of the global Executive Board of the International Union for Health Promotion and Education, an associate editor of *Global Health Promotion* (an SSCI journal); and the Founding President of Health and Sustainable Development Foundation.

Prof. Chiou is the founder of Taiwan Network of Health Promoting Hospitals (HPH). She promoted it to become the largest HPH network in the world and was elected to serve as the Chair of Governance Board of, International Network of Health Promoting Hospitals and Health Services 2012-2014. In addition, she founded and chaired the Task Force on Health Promoting Hospitals and Environment 2010-2014. In Taiwan, Professor Chiou has been the leader of two local health bureaus and the national health promotion agency. She initiated several pioneering public health programs, such as healthy community development program in 1996, regional diabetes shared care system in 1996, Taipei Healthy City Project in 2002, health promoting hospital recognition in 2003, age-friendly hospitals and health services recognition in 2011, nationwide coverage of age-friendly city initiatives in 2013, etc. During COVID-19 pandemic, she published the book- "Reflecting the Impact of COVID-19 in Taiwan" (in Chinese) and co-authored "A multinational Delphi consensus to end the COVID-19 public health threat" published by Nature.

Prof. Chiou designed/co-designed and published 3 cluster randomized controlled trials to prove the effectiveness of setting-based health promotion interventions. She authored more than 90 SCI/SSCI papers, and has received many honorable awards such as the Distinguished Achievement Award for Outstanding Civil Servants (1999), model civil servants (1999, 2012) and the Award for Top Ten Outstanding Young Women (2000) in Taiwan.

Professor Oliver Groene,

CEO of International Network of Health

Prof Dr Oliver Groene is CEO of the International HPH Network and responsible for overall strategy implementation within the network. He is a health services researcher and manager with 20 years of experience. Within the HPH context, his particular area of expertise is the development of standards and the development of methodological approaches to assess the climate impact of the health care delivery system. Previous positions include Associate Professor in health services research at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and Manager of the Quality of Health Systems Programme at the World Health Organization Regional Office for Europe. He holds an MSc and PhD in public health and an M.A. in medical sociology and organizational sciences and an appointment as Professor at the Faculty of Management, Economics and Society at the University of Witten/Herdecke. He publishes widely on health services research topics (H-Index: 45) and served as deputy editor for the International Journal for Quality in Health Care from 2015-2019.



Professor Liang-Kung Chen,

Prof. Liang-Kung Chen obtained his MD from National Yang-Ming University in 1996 and went on a PhD focused on health, welfare and public policy. In 2006, Prof. Chen became the Director of the Center for Geriatrics and Gerontology at Taipei Veterans General Hospital, where he developed innovative solutions for older people's healthcare needs. In 2014, he was appointed as the Director of the Aging and Health Research Center at National Yang Ming University, which was later renamed as the Center for Healthy Longevity and Aging Sciences.

Prof. Chen has published over 450 peer-reviewed articles in leading journals. His research covers frailty and sarcopenia, age-friendly healthcare, smart healthcare and artificial intelligence. Prof. Chen

is actively engaged in international collaborations for research and healthcare reforms for older people and serves as the editor for several prestigious international academic journals. In the capacity of a thought leader, Prof. Chen actively advocates for the promotion of healthy aging on an international scale, dedicating substantial efforts to educating both professionals and the general public with the aim of attaining a state of healthy longevity.



Dr. Cheng-Chie Weng,

Director of Integrated Long-Term Care Center and Family Medicine Department in Chiayi Christian Hospital, Taiwan

Dr. Weng had ever been the director of local public health center and served in local clinic during 2012-2019. In the recent three years , he led the team to triple the number of people served by home-integrated medical care, with a medication integration rate of 99%. Drawing on his past experience working in both the community and the hospital, he successfully bridged the hospital's home medical care with the long-term home care service system, establishing a medical-care integration operation model that leads the industry in Taiwan.



Dr. Bogdan Chiva Giurca,

Global Lead and Clinical Lead, National Academy for Social Prescribing, UK

Dr. Bogdan is a British physician, currently working as the Clinical Lead and Global Director of the National Academy for Social Prescribing which was founded in 2019 by the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care. Bogdan has played a key role in the development of Social Prescribing in England since 2015 through establishing and chairing the NHS England Social Prescribing Champion Scheme (2015-2022) consisting of over 20,000 doctors, medical and healthcare trainees championing the subject in their own institution.

His work has influenced national and international healthcare policy and has been instrumental to spreading and scaling social prescribing globally by hosting delegations and ministerial visits from over 30 countries, as well as implementing social prescribing in the core curricula of the majority of

universities and medical schools within the UK. Bogdan has contributed to several peer-reviewed publications and policy documents, including the NHS Long Term Plan, the Personalised Care Model, GP Partnership Review, as well as authoring three books on medical education.

As an Honorary Lecturer, Bogdan currently lectures at University College London as part of the MASc on Creative Health. In addition, he holds teaching roles at Imperial College London, Harvard Global Health Institute, and has recently been named 'Top 100 Most Influential People in Health' in the UK (Health Service Journal Top 100, 2022).



Dr. Vania de la Fuente-Nunez,

Independent senior consultant in healthy ageing; former WHO technical officer, Demographic Change and Healthy Ageing Unit.

Dr Vânia de la Fuente-Núñez works as an independent senior consultant in healthy ageing, offering technical and strategic advice to different entities to help improve the lives of older people, their families, and communities. Her portfolio of services to advance the UN Decade of Healthy Ageing (2021-2030) ranges from research, advocacy and capacity building to strategy or policy development and evaluation. She is a recognized public speaker, who is spearheading efforts to attract funding in this space, develop national policies, and support organizations and governments to better respond to population ageing.

Before working as an independent consultant, Dr de la Fuente-Núñez worked as an international civil servant for the World Health Organization for close to a decade. In this role, she was responsible for the Global Campaign to Combat Ageism, co-authoring the landmark Global Report on Ageism of the United Nations. She also led the area of capacity building on healthy ageing, implementing innovative learning programs and supporting the development of healthy ageing policies and programs in countries and regions around the world. She further contributed to the launch of WHO's Global Observatory for Health Research and Development and supported the Secretariat of the WHO Research Ethics Committee during the 2014-15 Ebola outbreak.

Previously, Vânia worked with different NGOs and research institutes in high- and low- income countries, including Spain, Senegal, and The Gambia.

Graduated in Medicine from the University of Santiago de Compostela and in Social and Cultural Anthropology from UNED, Dr. de la Fuente-Núñez also has a Master's Degree in Philosophy, Politics and Health Economics from University College London.
